

ANNUAL REPORT JULY 2015 – JUNE 2016

"We will never, never, never, never, never, never, never, give up!" is the soundtrack behind the story of the Bokamoso Life Centre (BLC) in Winterveldt, South Africa. Bokamoso means "future"—and the youth strongly affirmed their hopes and dreams for a better future in 2015-2016. The Centre and the Bokamoso Youth Foundation (BYF) in Washington, DC, continued a strong partnership to help the youth lay the groundwork for that future, reaffirming the mission in the development of new, more resilient structures.

A Resilient Youth Centre in Winterveldt, South Africa

The Bokamoso Life Centre is alive with positive energy. In 2016, dozens of young South Africans participated in the Centre's Adolescent Development Program (ADP) and served as mentors, leading life skills and AIDS awareness programs in the LoveLife program.

- After exploring vocational opportunities and with the scholarship support of the BYF, 38 youth enrolled in colleges and vocational educational schools in South Africa in 2016.
- Many of the youth participated in activities of their choice, including the Centre's drama group, where they practiced to present plays in South Africa and in the annual arts tour to the United States.
- BLC youth coordinated a 40th anniversary commemoration of the June 16th Soweto uprising, walking through Winterveldt singing and celebrating with games at the Centre.
- Through ADP, they participated in monthly writing workshops and vocational counseling led by instructors from the University of South Africa.

A Vital International Partnership

The widening circle of Bokamoso supporters in the U.S. continues to find new ways to aid the youths' efforts to transform their lives. Creative ideas in 2015-2016 included an initiative by youth in the International Development Course at St. Andrew's Episcopal School to raise funds in support of specific projects in Winterveldt; a DC area yoga fundraising event, creatively marketed from South Africa with the Bokamoso youth in a yoga "tree pose"; and a U.S. June 16th commemoration featuring "Dinner and a Movie"—showing "Snakes and Lizards," a movie shown on South African television that was directed by Kenneth Mdluli and featured Pearl Mdluli, Mandla Sibanda, and Sipho Mokoena, all Bokamoso alumni.


In January-February 2016, 12 youth, led by Centre staff members Doreen Mnisi and Steve

Baloyi, performed their plays, music and dances in the Washington DC area on the 15th annual U.S. tour (photo above). They participated with supporting organizations including **St. Andrew's Episcopal School (SAES), Seekers Church, George Washington University (GWU), Metropolitan Memorial United Methodist Church, All Souls Church, Westminster Presbyterian Church,** and **InterPlay.** With the Bokamoso Youth Foundation's support, they successfully raised funds to support the Centre operations and the scholarship program in South Africa.
